Malden Youth Photovoice is an initiative of the Cambridge Health Alliance's Department of Community Health, funded by the Massachusetts Department of Public Health's Office of Problem Gambling Services.

During the 2024 - 2025 school year, Malden High School students met weekly after school to explore issues related to youth problem gambling, and prevention strategies. They also gained advocacy and photography skills while learning about health disparities and equity, the historical role and power of youth voice, and healthy risk-taking.

This program seeks to empower youth by providing problem gambling education and supporting youth in expressing their own prevention message through photography.

This year the group Call to Action focuses on advocating for safe, enjoyable, and better quality food for all students that meets their nutritional needs and will help them thrive in the classroom.






This is a photo of the Malden


<u>Hazel</u>

This experience also showed that the space in the restaurant and the community outside of it was filled with many problems. 

The Heart of the Community



funny!



dance, sing, and act!










Hi all! I'm Vin, and am a junior at Malden High School. I love going to concerts and collecting trinkets.
